FUNCTIONS AND POLICIES OF DECISION MAKING IN INVESTMENT ARBITRAL AWARDS

Professor Cass Sunstein once commented “[k]nowledge of the law consists in large part of an understanding of prevailing interpretive practices within the legal community”.

Our presentation speaker, Dr Mary Mitsi (author of a 2019 book titled “The Decision-Making Process of Investor-State Arbitration Tribunals”), and panel speakers will seek to analyse the ways arbitral tribunals reason their decisions and the use of precedents, customary law, general principles of law and policies in the decision making process.

Further, the panel will touch upon the issues of legitimacy, predictability, persuasion and law development as functions of an arbitral tribunal’s reasoning in its awards. They will also consider these questions in the context of the SIAC Investment Arbitration Rules.
